May 23, 2007 Nalls Donate Land for Paddle Access

Longtime Burlington residents George and Jerrie Nall donated a two-acre tract adjacent to the Glencoe Mill Village this week. The parcel is located at the intersection of Glencoe Street and Highway 62 on the north bank of the Haw River. The Nalls' gift was inspired by a desire to provide the Haw River Trail with a highly visible location from which to educate the public about the Trail and the HRT's corresponding conservation efforts. Plans for the land include a new Haw River Paddle Trail Access which will open an exciting stretch of river between Glencoe and the Graham access on Highway 54. The property will also house the Haw River Trail/Mountains to Sea Trail, connecting the new Alamance County park at Glencoe with trails on the former Carolina Mill site, now owned by Capitol Broadcasting Company of Durham. Haw River Trail Named Site on North Carolina Birding Trail

The North Carolina Birding Trail confirmed this week that the Haw River Trail will be named as a site on the Piedmont Section of the NCBT. The North Carolina Birding Trail publishes regional guide books to help birders find prime locations for viewing birds throughout the state. The Coastal region was completed in 2006 and the Piedmont regional trail guide is slated to be published in Fall 2007. One area of particular interest to birders on the Haw River Trail will be a wetland area on the Indian Valley to Glencoe segment of the Haw River Trail. The small wetland is within the Future Alamance County Park at Glencoe and will be easily accessible via the Haw River Trail, or off Greenwood Drive. The HRT's acceptance as a site on the birding trail will bring a significant contingent of birders to the burgeoning trail and will also be a boost for local businesses and hoteliers. April 24, 2007 <u>Alamance County Awarded New Grant for Glencoe Park</u>

The Alamance County Recreation and Parks Department was awarded an \$170,000 grant this week from the State of North Carolina to expand the new park near the Glencoe Mill Village. The grant was awarded from the North Carolina Natural Heritage Trust Fund, and will help Alamance County add to the 20 acres acquired earlier this year with a \$158,000 grant from the North Carolina Clean Water Management Trust Fund. The Alamance County Recreation and Parks Department plans to develop the site over into a passive-use park including a paddle access for the Haw River Paddle Trail, fishing accesses and picnic areas. The new park will also be a stop on the Haw River Trail and the Mountains-to-Sea Trail.

April 12, 2007 Get Outdoors! provides 8 New Kayaks for Haw River Trail

Greensboro-based outfitter Get Outdoors has provided 8 new Wilderness Systems Pungo Kayaks to the Haw River Trail effort in 2007. Construction Under Way on Indian Valley-Glencoe Section of Haw River <u>Trail</u>

Trail work is under way on the newest stretch of the Haw River Trail. A crew from Dan River Prison Work Farm has been on site for almost 10 days clearing vegetation and building trail on the new route. The new trail will stretch from Indian Valley Paddle Access to Highway 62. Along the way, the trail will wind through the

soon to be opened Alamance County park and the historic Glencoe Mill Villiage, terminating at Glencoe Paddle Access. The trail will provide for fishing spots, a spur onto the island created by the Glencoe Mill race, and birdwatching on a site that has been nominated for the North Carolina Birding Trail.
